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Director's Message



NID Kurukshetra started its 3rd year of operations in 2019 and Year 2019-20 was a milestone year in different aspects. In July 2019, the fourth batch of students joined and in AY 2019-20, the Institute started the 4-year Graduate Diploma Program of Design (GDPD) with all four batches of students and all students started the Academic Year with a stay in the hostel premises of New Campus that was under construction. Subsequently, the Institute was included in the National Institute of Design Act 2014 through the National Institute of Design (Amendment) Act 2019 with effect from 13th January 2020, and the name of the Institute was changed to National Institute of Design, Haryana.

I joined the Institute as the first full-time Director in January 2019 and during the year 2019-20, some faculty members and administrative staff joined on regular appointment. This led to the systems and processes being established and the Vision for the Institute was articulated as 'To provide Design Education, rooted in values, that responds to social context, improves the quality of life and prepares thought leaders to address emerging global needs.'

During the year, the Institute logo was designed, got approved, and registered, the Institute website was started, the Institute domain mail id system was established and students and staff members issued the institute domain mail ids. Institute conducted its first Sports Meet named 'Josh' and outreach and Consultancy activities were initiated. The first MOU with an educational institution was signed in March 2020, when NID Haryana signed an MOU with IIT Roorkee for academic collaborations. In 2019, during summer vacations the first batch of students did a summer internship after concluding the 3rd year and in January 2020 the batch started Graduation Project under curriculum for the 8th semester with Industry and research organizations or in self-sponsored mode. This initiated the entry of NID Haryana students into professional work. Students won prestigious awards and faculty members presented papers at conferences or conducted sessions at Professional conferences.

With Institute being included in the National Institute of Design Act 2014, the Annual Accounts were prepared and got approved by the Governing Council, a CAG Audit of the accounts has been conducted, and Annual Report 2019-20 is being presented by the Institute.

The year 2019-20 concluded with the start of the Covid 19 pandemic and the National Level lockdown. It brought despair, but also took the Institute towards higher adoption of technology and adaptation of education for it to be conducted in the online mode. Our progress in this front showed that our systems as well as the small team of staff members were ready and agile for addressing the requirements brought forward by Covid. Details regarding it would be presented in the Annual Report 2020-21.

The journey of this historic year leads us to feel gratitude for all Departments, Institutions, and individuals who supported the Institute in its founding years and provided the present team a foundation to build up the Institute and achieve so much in this year. Details of all activities and operations are presented in the report and we

hope that the report conveys the pride felt by the team in achieving so much in so little time and in challenging situations.

NID Haryana strives to achieve the Vision established for the Institute, become a globally recognized design institution, and serve society with the work of alumni and the Institute.

1. Introduction



National Institute of Design, Kurukshetra was registered as a society under the Haryana Registration and Regulation of Societies Act, 2012 on 1st July 2015 by the Department of Industrial Policy and Promotion (DIPP), Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India. The academic programs commenced from the transit campus at Government Polytechnic, Umri, Kurukshetra formally on November 15, 2016. The institute was initially mentored by the National Institute of Design, Ahmedabad. The Institute was declared as an Institute of National Importance under Section 2 of the National Institutes of Design Act, 2014 vide the National Institute of Design (Amendment) Act 2019 with effect from 13th January 2020. The Institute was renamed as National Institute of Design, Haryana.

National Institute of Design, Haryana, offers a wide spectrum in design education while encouraging trans-disciplinary learning by doing. NID Haryana's trans-disciplinary environment consisting of diverse design domains helps in creating an innovative and holistic ecosystem for design learning and delivering solutions focusing on the emerging needs of people, integrated with digital and cutting-edge technologies.

Designing the Future

NID Haryana is the third NID to come up in the country after five decades of design excellence at the National Institute of Design, Ahmedabad. The Institute's full-fledged campus with state-of-the-art facilities operates from the transit campus located in Government Polytechnic Umri, Kurukshetra, Haryana.

NID Haryana in AY 2019-20 offered a full-time four-year Graduate Diploma Program in Design (GDPD) with Specialisation streams in Industrial Design, Communication Design, and Textile and Apparel Design with a multi-disciplinary approach to design education. With an interdisciplinary approach, the Institute is committed to fostering creative abilities and building attitudes required to address emerging challenges in shifting economies and emerging markets.

Learning to know and learning to do is the unfolding and underlying principle of design education at NID Haryana. The institute is established as a liberal education system built upon the fusion of theory and practice, and studio and workshop learning. Exposure to real-life professional projects and working prototypes are being employed as tools for education. The Workshops here are set up for making models and prototypes and are capable in certain cases of fair-sized production runs.

3. Design Education at NID Haryana

3.1 Professional Education Programmes / Academic Programmes



3.2 Foundation Discipline

The foundation programme or the first year of education in GDPD program at NID Haryana focuses on building a base of students who have a creative aptitude and require direction. The same has been discussed under the following subheads.

Programme Aims and Objectives:

- To introduce fundamentals of design.
- To support students in developing skills.
- To Support students in imbibing values and attitudes critical for a design career, in addition to discovering his/her own strengths and aptitude.
- The programme aims to inculcate design acumen based on the exposure provided through peer group discussions, inhouse faculty discussions, and exposure provided by visiting faculty and craftsmen.

• The programme is holistic and intense, and a student goes through a process of unlearning to learn.

Based on the journey, explorations, and realization of their strength and weakness, in 2nd year students branch out to the specialization disciplines.

Curriculum

The aims and objectives are met through the inputs in the curriculum structured under four pillars spread across 2 semesters in one year. Each module has its relevance and objective.

The teaching pedagogy is built on "hand on minds-on" and "learning to learn and learning to do" principles. This is facilitated through peer group discussions, exposure, field trips (see Annexure-A, Table A-1), and workshops conducted within the discipline.

3.3 Communication Design Discipline



"This Programme is the art of storytelling with multiple inputs from graphic design, animation, Film making which makes it relevant to contemporary and emerging design practice."

The Communication Design programme at NID Haryana introduces students to a range of design principles and practices in both regional and global contexts. During their period of study (2nd - 4th year), Communication design students are encouraged to bring a new vision to the graphic language of communication through signs, typography, digital design, spatial design, interaction design, Animation, Illustration, Branding, packaging, etc. Communication Design mediates messages to meanings and stories to experiences. NID Haryana offers this discipline in a

way that enables the students to explore the subdomains of communication design by means of analog to new media.

The modules are designed in a way where students have the freedom to choose their own projects ranging from Film, Animation, Graphic Design, Interface Design, and Interaction Design with basic modules that are common to all. Students are exposed to emerging global trends, the cultural and historical context in which the designers need to function as well as the social and ethical factors that influence design decisions and the ability to practice within a local and global context is a guiding principle of this program across the pathways.

3.4 Industrial Design Discipline

"Students are actively encouraged to participate in collaborative projects with industrial houses, social sector, government & MNCs. The Industrial Design discipline ($2^{nd} - 4^{th}$ year) assimilates inputs in diverse domains such as human factors, cognitive ergonomics, form studies, studio skills, advanced CAD, research methods, design management,

materials and manufacturing processes, and social sciences. Emphasis is on a process-centric approach that shapes a student's education through participation and teamwork. Design projects form the core of an Industrial designer's education and cover broad areas that Industrial designers are likely to encounter in their professional development.

The Industrial Design programme enables students to devise products and services based on user-oriented research, market analysis, technology opportunities, ergonomic criteria, engineering knowledge, business awareness, cultural appreciation and social responsibility to meet the emerging needs of both the market and society.

This faculty inculcates the user-centric design approach and processes.

Industrial design covers several areas of design. Some of these areas may include product design, car design, furniture design, ceramic design, and Bio design.

3.5 Textile & Apparel Design Discipline

Textile and Apparel Discipline is a unique programme $(2^{nd} - 4^{th} \text{ year})$ that thrives at the communion of skills set development and honing of creative and analytical abilities to meet the contemporary demands of industry and society. The Textile and Apparel Design discipline endeavours to develop pioneering and synergetic approaches to design for diverse sectors of the textile and apparel industry, start-ups and social sector. Inventive and creative explorations from concept to prototype are invigorated by means of providing students with both the conceptual and technological assistance to achieve the requisite design requirements. The curriculum emphasizes on building a variety of skills, in combination with theoretical knowledge and practical applications. The program commences with the fundamentals of textile and apparel design. This includes textile Fibres, weave structure, surface design, dyeing techniques, printing methods, fundamental sewing techniques, pattern making, constructed textiles and basic inputs in garment design. Through increasingly complex design projects, complemented by related social sciences, fashion, trends, brand identity, technology and computeraided design, students are encouraged to design textiles and apparel for fashion, crafts and home The program includes furnishings. several interdisciplinary projects of designing textiles and apparel for Public paces /Exhibition/Interiors, lifestyle, and apparels and for the allied Industry. In 2019-20, curriculum at Textile and Apparel Design at NID Haryana involved workshop and lab

explorations while acquiring skill set and also exploring its potentials. The discipline includes Craft research and field studies and advanced weaving as core courses in combination with subordinating courses like Communication Graphics, Design Management and Science and Liberal Arts. Design Workshop is another category of course which provides opportunity to the students to study allied domains and explore the application to the core area of Textile and Apparel Design Discipline.

Craft Exposures- In AY 2019-20 One of the group of four students had travelled to Bagh in Madhya Pradesh to study the genesis and evolution brought about in the Printing tradition of the state. The students had taken into consideration the printing styles, motif vocabulary and techniques of block printing carried out in Bagh, Kokshi and bhairavgarh centers of printing located in the western belt of Madhya Pradesh. Another batch had travelled to Orissa in order to understand the single Ikat weaving tradition in India. The group of the other four students had conducted the case study of villages Bijepur and Bagbadi in Bargarh district. The group had tried to map the market, kinship between various stakeholders including roles of the Government and non-Government bodies. They had mapped the system by means of Value Chain Analysis and existent category of skill set present in the community. Each group had spent fifteen days on field. The exposure, thus, lead to the multifaceted learning wherein students had opportunity to not only relate and examine their classroom learning with the weaving and printing techniques on field but also develop an understanding of social context, market requirement, business models and exclusivity regional textile production. Students had later spent two weeks in class on processing information and preparing drafts for document.

Academic Planning during Covid 19 Lockdown:

During March 2020, the Lockdown due to Covid-19 Pandemic happened; the Institute was closed for on campus activities. During this time the courses were planned in a way that students could effectively manage to learn online, from their homes.

3.6 Educational Facilities / Infrastructure

The interdependence between design and production is deemed essential at NID Haryana. The infrastructure consists of well-equipped department workshops, Information Technology Labs with the latest software, and a Resource Centre that houses a variety of reference material like books, journals, periodicals, and films.

Department Workshops:

Rigorous practice lays the foundation for acquiring the skills, know-how, and familiarity required to understand production methods. The workshop infrastructure is equipped with the latest machines, tools, and equipment in wood, metal, ceramics, textiles, photography, and film making to facilitate learning about technological processes.

Industrial Design Workshop

The industrial design workshop of NIDH is a state-of-the-art workshop facility developed at the institute. The Institute has established three major workshops to learn and practice-wide range of manufacturing processes and to develop prototyping skills among the students. These three major workshops include a carpentry workshop, metal workshop, and ceramic workshop. The carpentry workshop is equipped with industrial-grade wood working machines such as a circular saw, planner, thicknesser, sanding machine, wood working lathe machine, jig saw, etc. apart from these machines, this workshop is furnished with an

extensive range of carpentry hand tools and portable power tools. The metal workshop is furnished with the industrial-grade machining and joining process. It includes a capstan turret lathe machine, band saw machine, and electric arc machine along with a wide range of hand tools and power tools. The ceramic workshop is also well versed with electric potter wheels, electric plaster wheels, and other machines. The ceramic lab is also equipped with an industrial-grade fire kiln. These facilities in the workshop provide the experience that helps in the understanding of the complexity of the real industrial jobs, along with time and skills requirements of these jobs. In addition to these three major workshops students have access to some of the advance manufacturing process including Laser Cutting machines, Vacuum forming machines and Makerbot-3D printers, and extensive equipment facilities for the manufacturing process providing a comprehensive knowledge regarding the technicalities and details of a design. Apart from manufacturing machines, basic raw materials are also provided to students in the workshop.

3.7 Communication Design Facilities

In the Communication Design Discipline, there is a Dark room studio for Animation design work and a MAC lab for IT-related facilities. Communication

design Discipline has equipment purchased for photography.

3.8 Pattern Making & Sewing Lab

The Textile and Apparel Design Department at NID-Haryana is equipped with a state-of-the-art Pattern Making and Sewing Lab for the students and members. The pattern-making lab consists of new and advanced big pattern-making tables, international sizing mannequins of different types and all the other required equipment for the ease of students while developing new patterns.

The sewing lab has a wide variety of sewing machines as per the industry standards so that the students can be at par with the industry experience

while learning and working on these machines. The lab has motorized single stitch machines, over-lock machines, steam press and different attachments for special types of seams as well. Even though the labs are still a work in process and the institute is working on further enhancing the lab facilities, the existing labs and its members ensure that the students are able to develop anything that they want to, using these lab facilities.

3.9 Weaving Lab

Weaving Lab at NID Haryana is fully equipped with 20 teakwood table-top Handlooms each with the capacity to incorporate 12 shafts at a time. Along with the handlooms, There are Teak Wood Creel Stand, two Teak Wood Flat Warp and M S Charkha as the supporting equipment for Weaving. The Lab houses 3 Flatbed Hand Knitting machines along with the required hand tools for knitting, crocheting and embroidery. It has an in-house yarn library with varied counts and quality. To impart the knowledge under the guidance and supervision of

the in-house Textile and Apparel Design faculties and skilled Lab —attendants, NID Haryana encourages students to follow a research-led practical approach towards design. NID, Haryana is situated in the vicinity of textile hubs like Panipat, Ambala and Ludhiana. The institute has good connections with various organisations in the Textile industry which helps our students to enhance their knowledge through industrial visits as a part of their course curriculum.









3.10 Dyeing & Printing Lab

"NID-H is equipped with in-house dyeing and printing facilities. The students get the opportunity to be a part of the dyeing and printing process from scratch. The students get to enrich their knowledge base by practicing the things learnt in text books in their practical form. The NID-H dyeing lab offers

both types of dyeing options- Synthetic Dyeing and Natural Dyeing. Various types of Synthetic Dyeing options are available for the students- Reactive dyes, Direct dyes, Acid dyes, Vat dyes, etc. The Natural Dyeing options include- Pomegranate, Lac, Flowers, Turmeric, etc. The printing lab offers

Screen Printing and Block Printing options for the students. The students can make their own screens of their designs in the printing lab and this gives them the real time experience of visually seeing their designs coming to life."

3.11 IT Lab

The IT section at NID Haryana caters to all computing and networking facilities for the students for their learning and faculty for teaching design education. One cannot imagine design education learning without the use of digital technologies, information includes IT equipment's like interactive displays for sketching, high end workstations and Software for designing like Adobe Creative Cloud, Dragon frame and many more

The COVID-19 crisis has affected the educational institutes all over the world and increased the screen time for students, faculty, and staff members. In this difficult time, IT Section adapted to face the challenges and facilitate with alternative learning platforms through digital technologies and online education resources like Google Meet, Google Classroom that enable students and faculty to cooperate and ensure that interruption to education is as limited as possible.

Major Updates during 2019-20:

During the year 2019-20, the institute registered its domain(nidh.ac.in) through ERNET India, started Domain email services and hosted institute website on cloud server. The content updation and maintenance on website is also managed by the IT Section.

During this year the email accounts on institute domain(nidh.ac.in) were provided to all bonafide students, regular staff of the institute and sections.

Brief of IT Facilities includes:

 Being Central facility, IT section maintains Local Area Network (LAN) which connects transit campus, hostel, and library and provides

- Internet & Wi-Fi facility to students, faculty, and staff. Two (02) internet Leased Lines are technical with capacity of 100 Mbps (PGCIL) and 10 Mbps (BSNL) for smooth functioning of internet services on 24x7 basis. It also maintains servers like DHCP, DNS and Firewall.
- Three (03) IT labs include Industrial Design Lab, Communication Design lab and Common IT lab with Latest Equipments, Computers & software. All labs are provided with UPS backup and airconditioning.
- Computer Systems including high end workstations (HP Z440 with Xeon E51620 Processor, 32 GB Ram), Apple iMac Retina 5K, and Desktops with latest software and antivirus and Wacom Cintiq Interactive Display and Intous Pro Pen Tablets are available.

Software

 Designing & Other Software including Adobe Creative Cloud, Rhino, Keyshot, Solidworks, Email on google and all associated apps like (Google Drive, Meet, Calender, Classroom, Docs etc.) Audesk – Autocad and Alias. The procurement of Office 365 for faculty and students was under process in March 2020.

Institute Level Events supported by IT:

 The IT section provided all technical support in organising the institute level events like Studio Test for Admissions, Orientation Day 2019 and Celebration of Foundation Day 2019. Details of some of the available software are as below.

a) Autodesk (Auto-CAD, ALIAS, SKETCHBOOK, MAYA, 3D MAX)

Software from Autodesk has been used in many fields such as design, architecture, engineering, construction, manufacturing and entertainment. It empowers innovators to make their imagination possible. Autodesk is well known for its 3D modelling and CAD software, as CAD software is always based on precise technical drawing for product design and engineering purposes whereas 3D modelling is more like sculpting aimed more at video game designers. Following are a few CAD and 3D Modelling software:

AutoCAD

AutoCAD is software that is widely used by Architects and Designers for space designing, floor planning and technical drawing of the products. It eases the job of creating 2D and 3D drawings. It is also compatible with other Autodesk Software and can be switched between other Autodesk Software in real-time.

Autodesk alias is a caid (Computer-Aided Industrial design) Software predominantly used in the automotive and industrial design industry for 3D modelling.

Autodesk being free to avail, sketchbook is a software compatible with both windows and MAC and also works with android. It has painting and drawing tools such as pencil, markers and brushes enabling designers to do digital illustration. It uses pressure-sensitive features of digital drawing pads, tablet computers, and smart phones to create effects similar to traditional materials.

Maya

Maya is one software that is mostly used in the video game industry as it provides modellers and animators efficient modelling, rendering, simulation, texturing and animation tools. It can also be used for 3D printing and animated graphics.

b) SolidWorks

SolidWorks is a solid modelling computer-aided design and computer-aided engineering computer program published by Dassault Systèmes, that runs primarily on Microsoft Windows. Solidworks is preferred by designers for 3D CAD design and has a parametric design approach. Industrial Design students are more benefited from this software as it mainly serves 3D Design of automotive, aerospace, machinery and electronics. Solidworks is used for creating 3D parts and assembly design, animation and rendering, computer-aided manufacturing (CAM), etc.

c) Adobe Creative Cloud

Adobe Creative Cloud is a series of Adobe Inc. applications and services that provide users with access to software for graphic design, video

editing, web creation, and photography, as well as a range of smartphone apps and some optional cloud services. Following are the few software from Adobe Creative Cloud for creativity and design:

Adobe creative cloud allows designers to enhance their creativity and design and give shape to their imagination. This is one series of applications which a designer needs to learn to present their imagination for creating graphics, multimedia, photo and video editing by using the various following apps for mobile and laptop/desktop.

d) Rhino-Rhinoceros 3D

Rhinoceros is a commercial 3D computer graphics and computer-aided design (CAD) application software. Rhinoceros is used in industries such as construction, industrial design (e.g. automotive design, watercraft design), product design (e.g. jewellery design), digital, and graphic design for computer-aided design (CAD), computer-aided manufacturing (CAM), rapid prototyping, 3D printing, and reverse engineering. It is also not always possible to make a physical prototype of the product, introducing this CAD software in the curriculum helps the students.

e) KeyShot9

KeyShot offers real-time 3D rendering, which shows effects immediately and cuts down on the time it takes to produce realistic product visuals. For its speed, ease of use, scientifically accurate materials, and advanced material editing capabilities, brands all over the world rely on KeyShot. Students learn this software as it is very helpful for making digital prototypes as it also cost – effective which is also used in the industry.

f) Office 365 Pro Plus

Microsoft 365 Applications for Business is a subscription-based version of the always-up-to-date suite of web apps you already know and love (including Word, PowerPoint, Excel, Outlook, and Teams). Exclusive intelligent capabilities including

Ideas in Excel and Researcher in Word, real-time collaboration, Teams as the platform for teamwork, and advanced security features are all included in Microsoft 365 Apps for business.

Technology helps to teach and learn more meaningfully and fun. Office 365 plus pro is one such series of applications that allows educators and students to transform classroom time and the learning process. Office 365 includes applications like Word, Excel, PowerPoint but there are various other apps that can be helpful in the teaching and learning process. Microsoft Outlook includes an email client, calendar, address/contact book and manager. g) Miro

Miro, as a whiteboarding tool, assists the team with a wide range of collaborative activities, including workshopping, strategy mapping, Agile ceremonies, UX research and design, product creation, customer exploration, and process visualisation.

In the current scenario, Miro has come very handily for students and educators as it acts just like a whiteboard. It helps the user to brainstorm, discuss and present their ideas in one place virtually.

h) G-Suite for Education

G Suite for Education is a cloud-based system of Google's digital resources for hosting and distributing digital documents, communication, and collaboration.

G Suite for Education allows institution-wide email, this enables email connectivity for faculties, staff and students. It also helps to share a calendar that allows collaboration between faculty, staff and students. Another app is Google Classroom which makes it easy for students and teachers to connect from all around the world. Teachers can create an

assignment, send announcements and instantly start a class discussion, also students can interact and share in real-time. It also gives us unlimited cloud storage. Apps such as Docs, Spreadsheet, Form and Presentation can be very helpful as they can be collaborated and shared with other people and can be edited, viewed and commented on.

3.12 Resource Centre

In addition to learning by doing, the Resource centre houses books, journals & periodicals, research publications and films on a variety of subjects as reference and inspirational material for its stakeholders. The Resource Centre of NID-H always tries to enhance teaching and learning through flexible, diverse and user-centred information resources & its services. The library staff members work to create an organization that is receptive to innovation, recognized for efficient and focuses on continuous management improvement in services, resources, facilities and infrastructure. The Resource Centre is considered as the backbone of the Institute and it manages

digital, audio-visual material, diverse print, Prototype material in a seamless manner. Resource Centre has all the treasured wealth of knowledge showcasing the best collection of books, periodicals and other non-book resources from all corners of the world. The collective strength of all resources at the Resource Centre is aimed at giving the centre the power to provide services under one roof with online facilities to its stakeholders. Currently, NIDH Resource Centre, has more than 1660 books and 43 subscribed print periodicals. The Resource Centre System operates in a fully automated environment using KOHA Integrated Library Management Software.

Library OPAC

For the convenience of the users, books are arranged in a classified manner by using Dewey Decimal Classification Schema so as to save the time of the users and they could get the required book quickly. KOHA's OPAC interface allows stakeholders to perform searches, save results for the future reference and make recommendations online. All the Library facilities and services are supported by qualified and dedicated staff members who provide information services to its users. 2 terminals are placed in the stacking area for easy access by the users. An I.P. based access to OPAC has been provided for remote searching of books.

- Other innovative services are offered like remote access (On Campus/Off Campus) to e-Journals, Overdue Alert Email Service, moreover in the Resource centre, we adopt extensive strategies for awareness about library resources by preparing posters/flyers/mailers, user guides and put them on various notice boards and the institute's website.
- Services

Circulation Services

All the NIDH students, faculty and staff are eligible to become members of the Library. Having once received their Identity card cum Library membership card they can get the books issued from the Library. This service is in support of all the eligible members where they get advantage of getting a book issued, other reading materials to consult.

Reference Services- Various reference tools are available at the Resource Centre such as Dictionaries, Encyclopaedias, domain specific

books, & general reading collection. Separate reading rooms are also available for the readers.

Periodical Section Services- Resource Centre has subscribed to 43 (13 National + 30 International) Print Journal titles for its users. It also provides a separate Journal Room for its users. The resources such as print Journals, Technical & General Magazines, Newspapers, CDs/ DVDs, Gratis Collection etc. are kept in the Periodical section for the reference purpose.

4.13. Facilities

Hostel

In order to ensure hassle free campus living, the Institute has its own Hostel Accommodation and Mess Facilities. It has 02 hostels for students, one for Boys (2 wings) and one for Girls (2 wings) and one common block with Single Seater rooms and facilities like mess, common room and gym. Girls and Boys hostel have 182 rooms, whereas 32 rooms are single occupancy rooms in the common block. Rooms are well equipped with the bed, mattresses, study table, chair, cupboard, Curtains etc. Total hostel intake capacity is 396 students.

The campus facilitates a medical room and travel arrangement to Chandigarh every weekend (if required). The campus accommodates outdoor sports equipment, indoor games facilities and a music room for active living within the campus.

There is a common room for the hostellers with sitting infrastructure, Wi-Fi and indoor games facilities. Gym facility is also provided in the hostel complex.

Separate Audit Report on the accounts of National Institute of Design, Haryana (NID, Haryana) for the year 2019-20 and a copy of annual accounts of NID, Haryana for the year 2019-20 are enclosed. It may please be ensured that this Separate Audit Report is presented to the Governing Body as per rules before presenting it to both the Houses of Parliament. Two copies of the documents submitted to Parliament, indicating the date when they were presented to Parliament, may please be sent to this office and to the office of the comptroller and Auditor General of India.

Apart from the issues highlighted in the Separate Audit Report, it has also been noticed that the Accounts of NID, Haryana have been prepared on the basis of format of accounts prescribed vide National Institute of Design (Form of Annual Statement of Accounts) Rules, 2020. The accounts are not as per the Uniform Format of accounts prescribed by Controller General of Accounts for Autonomous bodies.

Following deficiencies have been observed in the financial statements of National Institute of Design (NID), Haryana:

a. National Institute of Design, Haryana has not prepared Statement of Receipts and Payments for the year 2019-20.

- b. Schedule 2 of financial statements should be pertaining to Reserves and Surplus and be shown as line item of Balance Sheet. The details of Reserves and Surplus, however, have not been given in separate schedule in balance sheet for the year 2019-20.
- c. Provision for accumulated leave encashment benefit to the employees is accrued and computed on the assumption that employees are entitled to receive the benefit at each year end. However in the financial statement, leave encashment has been shown on cash basis instead of accrual basis.

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India on the Accounts of National Institute of Design, Haryana for the year ended 31 March 2020

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of National Institute of Design (NID), Haryana as on 31st March 2020 and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 25(2) of the National Institute of Design Act, 2014. The preparation of these financial statements is the responsibility of the NID's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report (SAR) contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- i) We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purposes of our audit.
- ii) The Balance Sheet and Income & Expenditure Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format approved by Government of India, subject to our observations included in Separate Audit Report.
- iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by National Institute of Design, Haryana in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- iv) We further report that:

Comments on Accounts

A Balance Sheet

A.1 Liabilities

A.1.1 Current Liabilities (Schedule-5): ₹261.01 lakh

The above does not include an amount of ₹17.65 lakh being interest earned from Grant-in-Aid (capital) for the financial year 2019-20. As per clause (xxiii) of the sanction letter, interest earned on the recurring/non-recurring grant-in-aid should not be utilized by grantee for any purpose. The interest earned shall be either adjusted in next release or be refunded to Government of India (GoI) after the grants-in aid sanctioned is utilized.

NID, Haryana earned interest of ₹17.65 lakh from grants-in-aid (₹581.08 lakh). As the aforesaid fund pertained to GoI, the same should have been booked under current liabilities.

This has resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and overstatement of Earmarked Funds for the year by ₹17.65 lakh.

A.1.2 Current Liabilities and Provisions (Schedule-5): ₹261.01 lakh

The above does not include an amount of ₹3.06 lakh being balance amount payable to Central Public Works Department (CPWD), Karnal Central Division in respect of construction of Boundary wall at NID, Haryana. Several reminders were received from CPWD to release the balance amount but the same had not been paid by the Institute till 31.03.2020. Therefore, provision should have been created in the books of accounts.

Non-provision of the same has resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and overstatement Earmarked Funds for the year by ₹3.06 lakh.

A.1.3 Grant for new NID (Schedule-4): ₹575.23 lakh

The above does not include ₹18.51 lakh being grants for new NID, Haryana. NID, Ahmedabad had received a capital grant of ₹150.39 lakh from GoI for construction of boundary wall at NID Campus.

As per utilization certificate, the NID, Ahmedabad had paid ₹125 lakh in favour of CPWD for construction of boundary wall and utilized ₹18.51 lakh for laying foundation stone ceremony, recurring expenses and other expenses during the year 2014-15 & 2015-16. However, as per the terms and conditions of sanction letter, the grant shall be utilized only for construction of boundary wall at NID Campus, Haryana and balance grant should be refunded to GoI. Therefore, NID, Haryana should have recovered the amount of ₹18.51 lakh from NID Ahmedabad and should have refunded it to the GoI.

This has resulted in understatement of Grant in New NID and understatement of Current Assets (Receivables from NID, Ahmedabad) by ₹18.51 lakh.

A.2 Balance Sheet

A.2.1 Fixed Assets (Schedule-6): ₹100.20 lakh

NID Campus Building: ₹ Nil

Capital Work in Progress: Rs. 9547.60 lakh

The above includes ₹3574.90 lakh being the proportionate cost of boys' and girls' hostel buildings at NID Campus, Haryana. Boys Hostel Block-1 and Girls Hostel Block-1 were handed over to the NID, Haryana by NBCC in September 2018 and October 2018 respectively. The students had occupied the hostel from September 2018 onwards and the Institute had also received hostel fees during 2018-19 and 2019-20 respectively. As the hostel blocks were handed over to NID Haryana, the same should have been capitalized and depreciation should have been charged on the same.

Non-capitalization of the same has resulted in overstatement of CWIP and understatement of Fixed Assets (Building) by Rs. ₹3574.90 lakh. Further, non-charging of the depreciation on the building has resulted in understatement of depreciation fund and overstatement of Capital Fund by ₹255.35 lakh¹.

A.2.2 Fixed Assets (Schedule-6): ₹100.20 lakh Capital Work in Progress: ₹9547.60 lakh

The above includes ₹128.06 lakh (₹125.00 lakh paid + ₹3.06 lakh payable) being cost of construction of boundary wall at NID, Haryana by CPWD Chandigarh. The construction of boundary wall was completed on 23.04.2015 and the same was inspected by the Committee constituted by Ministry of Commerce & Industry before taking the possession. As the work of boundary wall had been completed and handed over to NID Haryana, the same should have been capitalized and depreciation should have been charged thereon.

Non-capitalization the same has resulted overstatement of CWIP and understatement of Fixed Assets by ₹128.06 lakh. Further, non-charging of depreciation has resulted in understatement of Depreciation Fund by ₹20.65 lakh² for five years i.e. from 2015-16 to 2019-20 and overstatement of Capital Fund to the same extent.

B. Grant-in-aid

NID Haryana had unutilized grant of ₹2.32 crore at the close of the year 2018-19 and same was carried forward to next year 2019-20. The Institute received grant of ₹11.44 crore under different heads (General: ₹5.50 crore, Capital: ₹4.19 crore, Salary: ₹1.75 crore) from Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade, Ministry of Commerce and Industry during the year 2019-20. Out of this, NID Haryana

utilized ₹6.44 crore (General: ₹4.12 crore, Capital: ₹0.57 crore, Salary: ₹1.75 crore) with unspent balance of ₹7.32 crore carried forward to next year 2020-21.

- **C.** Deficiencies which have not been included in this Separate Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Management through a Management Letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.
- v) Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet and the Income and Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi) In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanation given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes to Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in the Annexure, give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India:
- a) In so far as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of National Institute of Design, Haryana as at 31 March 2020; and
- b) In so far as it relates to the Income and Expenditure account, of the surplus for the year ended on that date.



1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

a. ACCOUNTING CONVENTION:

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of the historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting except for liability towards privileged leave and gratuity.

b. PROPERTY, PLANT & EQUIPMENT AND DEPRECIATION

- Government grants to the extent utilized towards capital expenditure are transferred to Capital Fund.
- Government grants for meeting revenue expenditure are treated as income of the year to the extent of expenditure incurred.
- 4. Unutilized grants are carried forward and exhibited as a Liability in Balance Sheet.

d. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTION:

Transaction denominated in foreign currency are accounted for at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction. The bank balance held in foreign currency is converted into Rupee RBI rate prevailing on the closing day of the financial year.
